



# Religious education in the Senior years

- Catholic Studies program, called 3:16 and 10:10 which are scripture passages in the Gospel of John
- Partnered with St Laurence's College and Padua
   College to devise this program in response to the new Senior system
- Validated by the Archdiocese of Brisbane and Brisbane Catholic Education



# RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

- Practical experience lessons and a theory lesson each fortnightly cycle
- Practical activities are held on and off campus and include reading activities at local State and Catholic schools, tending to graves at Hemmant Cemetery, packing birthing kits to be sent to developing countries
- Theory lessons explore concepts such as servant leadership and ethics
- These lessons are prioritised and are not to be impacted by other commitments

# What you need to get your QCE

- At least 20 credits by the end of Year 12
- Each QCAA subject has a potential 4 credits on offer:
  - Unit 1 = 1 credit
  - Unit 2 = 1 credit
  - Unit 3 + 4 = 2 credits (no splitting)
- Must pass at least one English and one Maths Unit (any)
- Both Year 11 and Year 12 count
- Almost any combination of subjects is allowed
- Certificate III courses at Iona = 7 or 8 credits

# STUDENT ELIGIBILITY SCENARIO

# Year 11 subject prerequisites and uni subject requisites

Year 11 subject prerequisites:

- A minimum grade required to be eligible to select a subject
- Based on Semester 1 results of Year 10
- To study English in Year 11 at Iona College, you must achieve AT LEAST a "C" this semester in English

University subject requisites:

- Most university courses require students to have studied English at Year 11 and 12
- Some university courses require students to have studied Maths Methods, Biology, Physics or Chemistry at Year 11 and 12



## Recommended minimum requirements (prerequisites)

Students MUST achieve the stated recommended minimum requirement to be accepted into some Year 11 and 12 subjects.

#### For example:

- C+ or higher in Year 10 English -> General English
- C or higher in Year 10 Physical Science -> Physics or Chemistry



# Subjects offered at the College can be categorised as:

- General (academic and rigorous)
- Applied (practical and authentic learning experiences)
- Essential (practical Maths and English)
- Vocational Education and Training (VET)

#### **Certificate Courses**

- If completed successfully, Certificate III courses delivered at Iona College contribute between 7 and 8 points to the QCE
- It is a qualification for post school
- It is a valid pathway into the workplace



# CERTIFICATE COURSES

# Australian Tertiary Admissions Rank (ATAR)

- Not everyone needs or wants an ATAR (used for University entrance)
- Based on five (5) best subjects
- Only Unit 3/4 results count
- Must pass a Year 12 English subject (any)
- Must study at least four (4) general subjects, plus any other two (2) subjects
- To maximise your ATAR you should consider studying six (6) general subjects
- One (1) certificate course or applied or essential subject can contribute
- 99.95 down to 0 in steps of 0.05
- Queensland Tertiary Admissions Centre (QTAC)





- ATAR is calculated through a process of scaling.
- QTAC explain scaling as a comparative measure based on actual subject achievement data and is expected to be different from one year to the next

#### Advice remains the same:

- Pick the subjects you like
- Pick the subjects you are good at and have met the prerequisite
- Pick the subjects you need

# Academic integrity means approaching academic responsibilities in an honest, moral and ethical way.

# Some types of misconduct include:

- having writing on your hand before or during an exam
- showing your work to another student
- using information from a source without referencing
- using AI to help you write/re-word your assignment



# **ACADEMIC INTEGRITY**

It is the school's responsibility to ensure that only work that teachers can verify as the student's own work, is graded.

To support this, teachers expect checkpoints, drafts, and work to be completed during class or under exam conditions.

Year 10 students will receive further support and course instruction to help them understand their responsibilities.


# Access arrangements and reasonable adjustments (AARA)

  - Social/emotional



# DO I NEED AN ATAR?

If students pick three or more applied/VET (Certificate) subjects, they will not qualify for an ATAR.

If that is the case, what is the possible pathway?

- Trade/Apprenticeship
- Defence Force
- Work

 TAFE or private provider for VET education



# Certificate III Subjects

- Different style of learning and assessment
- 7-8 QCE credits
- Some universities will convert the qualification to a selection rank – for example some universities may qualify a Cert III with a selection rank of 67
- They are a recognized qualification in industry, so we expect industry standard work.



#### Students who undertake an SBAT:

- one day per week at work
- may have to attend TAFE during holidays
- students are required to find an employer themselves
- areas include trades, sales, business, retail, fitness, hospitality, and information technology
- apprentices and trainees receive a training wage
- students will only qualify with school approval


